# Bouygues Telecom Foundation launches literary prize for first novel

## Unearthing new talents, the Bouygues Telecom Foundation's third challenge in 2007

The Bouygues Telecom Foundation today launched a literary prize in partnership with Calmann-Lévy, a French publishing house. The prize will be awarded to a debut novel written in French that includes text and instant messaging in the framework of the story. All genres are valid.

Authors are requested to submit their manuscript by 31 August 2007 (see <u>terms and conditions</u> below). The winning novel will be published by Calmann-Lévy and the author will receive €10,000 from the Bouygues Telecom Foundation.

Journalist François Vey and literary critic Clémence Boulouque will be members of the jury, which will also include three Bouygues Telecom employees.

In the same way as rap and slang, SMS, or texting language, has become a social phenomenon. Texting is used by groups of people to communicate in what started out as a "secret language". It has now become widely accepted and used, in the same way as mobile phones.
